We ended the day hearing once again from the men at MTU during their <u>closing remarks</u> and the <u>presentation</u> of an unexpected gift from the Restorative Justice Club at MTU. Mark Hartman, former MTU Restorative Justice Club member presented program director, Tricia Worrell with a beautiful hand-crafted mission award which left me speechless, in tears and overwhelmed with gratitude for our volunteers, our incarcerated brothers and this beautiful work we are blessed to do.
